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


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
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The Day Begins


A seagull flashes past as the sun glides up from the horizon. Along the beach, glints of light streak the foamy waves that lap the shore. Two surfers jog toward the water.

The city is also known for its Fourth of July celebration. The day begins with a parade. The first parade took place in 1904. It is the largest such parade in the West. Floats, marching bands, cars, and more stream down Main Street. People begin to gather in the area the day before to get a good seat. At night, a fireworks show lights up the sky off the pier.



Meet Rachelle Cracchiolo

Rachelle Cracchiolo (KRAK-ee-oh-loh) was a teacher for nine years. In 1977, she wrote a book for teachers. That book sparked the idea for a business. She named her company Teacher **Created Materials** (TCM). It started in her garage. It now has over 200 employees. TCM started in Huntington Beach. It is still based there.
